OUR SPEAKERS

Neil Burton is an architectural historian. He worked in the Greater London Council Historic Buildings Division and at English Heritage as an Inspector of Historic Buildings. More recently he was Secretary of The Georgian Group. He has published a number of works on historic buildings. Since 2001 he has been a director of The Architectural History Practice Ltd.

Simon Green is an architectural historian working in the Survey and Recording Section of Historic Environment Scotland. He is also researching ecclesiatical architecture, the Scottish Baronial and the Arts and Crafts Movement in Scotland. He has recently published 'Dumfries House, an architectural story'. He is a trustee of the Scottish Redundant Churches Trust and is also the President of the Architectural Heritage Society of Scotland.

Ken Burgin has been involved in the restoration of the Cotswold Canals since 1976. Previously Vice Chairman of the Cotswold Canals Trust, he has been CEO since 2008. From 1993 until 2001, he was Managing Director and subsequently Chief Executive of Motion Media PLC, which he led from start-up to a full listing on the main London Stock Exchange.

Mary Greensted MPhil, AMA is a freelance curator, lecturer, and writer, who was for many years responsible for Cheltenham Art Gallery & Museum's internationally important Arts and Crafts Movement collection.

In 2005 she contributed to the V&A's major exhibition 'International Arts and Crafts'. She has co-authored three catalogues on Cheltenham's Arts and Crafts collections and published books on the Arts and Crafts Movement. Mary has completed a Masters research project at Birmingham University on 'Exchanges between Britain and Greece as part of the Arts and Crafts Movement' and organized a major conference on the subject in London for the British School in Athens. She is currently working with Annette Carruthers and Barley Roscoe on a major book on Ernest Gimson.

Mary is a trustee of Court Barn, the museum of craft and design in the north Cotswolds at Chipping Campden, Gloucestershire and chairman of the Gloucestershire Guild of Craftsmen.

Alan Pilbeam is a retired schoolmaster (Sir Thomas Rich's School, Gloucester), geographer, an Oxford graduate and a local historian. For twenty-five years gave a popular course on the local landscape for Bristol University.

Alan's book 'Gloucestershire 300 Years Ago' was published by the History Press in 2012 to celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of the publication of Sir Robert Atkyn's 'Ancient and Present State of Glostershire'.

SYMPOSIUM CHAIR

Humphrey Welfare He was Director of Architectural and Archaeological Survey within RCHME, and he took this role (in an expanded form) into English Heritage when the two organisations merged. Latterly he was the English Heritage Planning and Development Director for the North (comprising the North West, the North East, and Yorkshire). He retired in 2011.

Humphrey is a Trustee of **The Churches Conservation Trust** (and chairs its Conservation Committee), a member of the Carlisle Diocesan Advisory Committee, and a member of the Fabric Advisory Committee for Durham Cathedral, and for Carlisle Cathedral.
