### Did you know...?



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A coat of arms is unique to a family or a person.

The colours and pictures are symbolic so the design is intended to represent the family's identity and values. This crest is from St Peter's Church, Sudbury in Suffolk. A dog might signify loyalty, a feather obedience and a helmet strength.

Displaying a coat of arms on a shield, banner or pennant was useful in battle for identifying who was on which side.

These emblems are often found inside churches. They remind everyone that a particular family or person had a connection with the building. Perhaps they paid for part of the church.

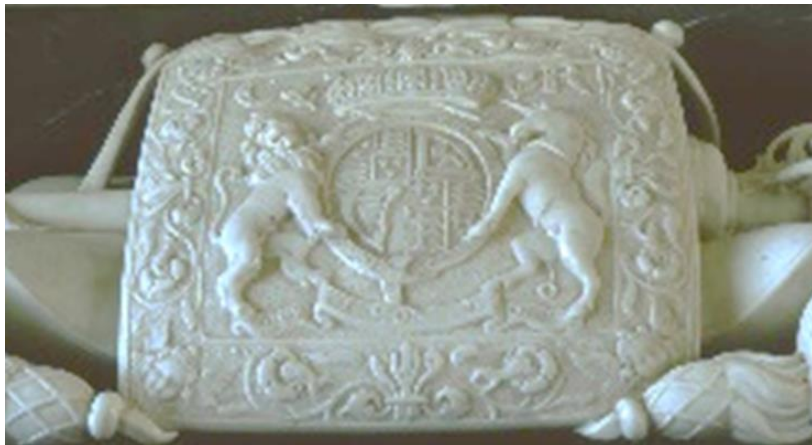

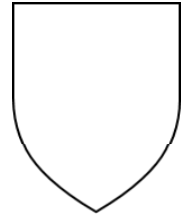
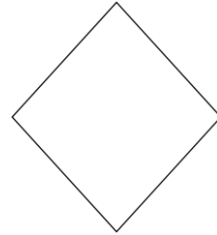


# Explore and Create: Hidden Heraldry

## Can you create your own coat of arms?

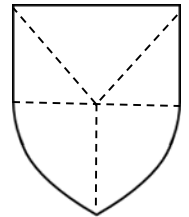
### Start by choosing the shape.

A diamond or a heater (the typical medieval shield shape).



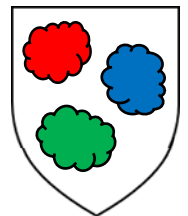
### Do you want to divide the background?

Horizontally, vertically, diagonally or a using a combination of a dividing lines?



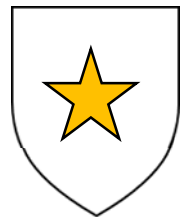
### Decide which colours to use.

Pick bright colours and perhaps add some silver or gold.



### What symbols will you add?
